# DAVID HALL 'THE SITUATION ENVISAGED'

# DAVID HALL:

Born 1937. A founder member of London Video Arts; has been involved in organising a number of video shows; writes on video art and is a regular contributor to Studio International. Established and is currently head of the Film, Video and sound dept., Maidstone College of Art. Lives and works in London.

THE SITUATION ENVISAGED 1978

Eight domestic TV receivers are placed side by side at eye level on a wall-to-wall support in a quarter circle across the darkened corner of a room (taking the corner as the centre point). Each is facing away from the viewer and into the enclosed space, and each is tuned to a different broadcast channel from the next. Hence the viewer hears a loud conglomeration of sound, and one sees only the projected glow beyond and above the line of TV sets. However on approaching them the screen of a video monitor can be glimpsed (in the corner) through a small gap between each alternate receiver. On it is playing as videotape, the content of which is difficult to decipher since the gap is so fine that it restricts the visual field to only a narrow vertical section of the screen, the four possible view points each rendering a different strip visible - suggesting an attempt to assemble the imformation coherently as the viwer moves from view point to view point. In doing so the tape time continuum is broken. Expectations of a narrative progression are both implied and rejected according to the structure of the tape -sometimes phasing (by coincidence) with the movements of the viewer, other times not. The image fragments seen have private/domestic connotations rather than public/T.V.

The intention is an exploration of time/space concepts in the reading of a prescribed physical context and a 'removed' synthetic context as presented through the T.V. medium, primarily by an upheaval or reversal of roles (T.V. relative to viewer) at different levels of attention. The work may be seen either as a number of distinct parallels, or a complex of all.

Born 1953, Japan.


Studied at St. Martin's School of Art 1974 - 78.

### LANDSCAPE:

I walk in no special direction until I find some very special image in the streets or in the landscape, for example; flowers, trees, river, sky, sea, sun etc. I bring the framed slides back to the gallery. I show 80 landscape slides using two slide projectors. The landscape slides are shown on the same wall at the same time. This makes a different kind of image. I leave some objects against the screen at different angles. The video cameras and the monitors set the diagonal in the space. Monitor I shows the objects, the slides, monitor 2 and sometimes spectators who come into the view of the video camera. Monitor 2 shows monitor I.
