Eau d'Artifice is Chris Meigh Andrews' hypnotic video sculpture of a shimmeringwaterfall, featuring 35 video monitors arranged in pyramid formation. Meigh-Andrews, in a pun on the flow of current, images and imaged water, incorporates wiring and playback decks as elements of the sculpture itself. Eau d'Artifice has been widely acclaimed for its subtle, mesmerising quality.

BLAST THEORY CHEMICAL WEDDING

Combining elements of theatre, dance and technology, Blast Theory present this fusion with style and excitement, creating unsettling and arresting work performed at a relentless pace.

Chemical Wedding is a promenade piece which explores perceptions of AIDS and personal reponses to the disease from both gay and straight members of the group. Incorporating video screens, computers, electronic voice overs and performers harnessed above the ground, this work will grab hold and not let go. **N.B.**

In 1991, Bobby Baker opened her own North London kitchen to the public to showcase her own unique approach to performance, expression and cookery - the rest is history. Kitchen Show received unprecedented critical acclaim and media attention, leading to a tour of 'guest' kitchens in Britain, Europe, Australia and Canada.

Keith Khan's own work is diverse and multi-disciplined. Trained as a a sculptor, he has worked in numerous fields from TV to opera. Within the field of live art he has produced many pieces, 'Flying Costumes, Floating Tombs' won a London Dance and Performance award last year, and has been commissioned to make both installations, performances and sculptural projects. He is currently working towards a large scale project at the Theatre Royal, Stratford East, 'Moti Roti, Puttli Chunni' (Thick Bread, Thin Veils) based around the themes and visuals of popular Hindi film and culture. The majority of his work is collaborative in nature - whether with other artists or a community. He has worked for many years as a designer for the Notting Hill Carnival.
