Mineo Aayamaguchi

Kaleidoscope

Wed 2 Mar Aayamaguchi's Kaleidoscope uses twenty-five television -Sun 27 Mar screens, a giant dish and a twelve foot high triangle of 12.00-8.00 reflective beaten brass to transform the gallery into a mesmerizing environment of colour, form, light and sound.

> Aayamaguchi takes images 'captured by the synthetic eye of the video camera' from urban and rural landscapes. A field of marigolds hanging upside-down, a neon light flashing in a puddle, or a humble privet hedge are swooped up into a rushing flow of abstract forms and planes of colour, like some vast electronic colour field painting. This stream of images is multiplied and fractured across the video screens and bounced around the blacked-out space to create a hypnotic and breathtaking effect.

Heightening colour to an acid hyperreality, or using chroma-key, rapid edit and multi-screen constructions, Aayamaguchi also creates the systems-based soundtracks for his video installations and performances. In his exploration of purely formal and sculptural concerns he continues the pioneering work of video artist, Nam June Paik.

Born in Japan, Mineo Aayamaguchi studied at St Martin's School of Art, and has lived and worked in London since 1974. He has exhibited at the Tate, the Whitechapel and Air Galleries, and throughout Europe, North America and Japan.

Accidents in the Home

Wed 2 Mar During the last five years Graham Young has made a series of -Sun 27 Mar videos - Accidents in the Home - which he describes as 'a 12.00–8.00 series of excursions into the vagaries of domestic life'. The accidents are usually slight, rarely fatal and occasionally implied. The video works are usually short, rarely complicated and always tragi-comic.

> In a specially designed installation for the ICA, Young will show the complete series of Accidents for the first time.

Graham Young lives and works in London. His videos have been shown in many countries including Germany, Canada, the United States and Japan. The final work in the Accidents in the Home series was commissioned by Channel 4 as part of Ghosts in the Machine and will be screened on 1 April. A booklet with text by John Wyver is available.
