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WILL MILNE : FILM PROGRAMME Tuesday 11 January at 7.45

Born in 1952 Will Milne is an American who trained at Ealing School of Art and the Royal College of Art Film School. In this programme he presents a selection of his films which celebrate the pleasures of vision, explorations of the sensuousness of objects and images from everyday surroundings. In smooth, painterly caresses his camera follows the forms and shadows of the body curves, interiors, doors and windows viewed from both within and without. The very particular movements, cuts, dissolves and transmutations transform those intimate urban spaces simply and subtly: grainy-grey fadings and blacknesses, idling amongst the subjects to create a pace that is at once intimate, reflexive and strangely persuasive. "I have been interested in the points where the sensual becomes meaning, as when a frame can be read as a colour composition or as a spacial scene. My subjects are everyday beauty spots, particular (framing of) turns in the road or corners of the face...."

The Mespotamian Background UK1977 Colour (16 mins) invokes the cradle of civilisation only through the lacklustre verbiage of a selection of women in a selection of locations all strained through a set of unyielding schedules. "In its random beauty and structural procedure this film performs you as subject, constructs you as questioning memory." A.L.Rees.

STEVE HAWLEY : VIDEO Tuesday 18 January at 6.30 and 8.30



Steve Hawley is currently Video Fellow at the North East London Polytechnic. His video tapes have a seductive humourous quality, constantly drawing attention to the very human inconsistencies of thought and action. By setting up progressions of ideas which abound in illogical connections the tapes prod us into reflection on the ways in which we make sense of the world. By examining the processes and mediating agencies of memory, media or technology the tapes cunningly focus on how we draw conclusions and how we manage to get them wrong.

Bad Reasons UK1982 (20mins) is a trilogy on the disintegration of reason. In part one, the Undistributed Middle, a man moves around his flat, adopts positions and obsessively constructs syllogisms, but he keeps getting the arguments wrong. In the the second part the absurd iniquities of stereotypes are exposed in the Peter and Mary texts of childhood so that We Have Fun Drawing Conclusions exploits the ironic humour of recognition to make a strong political point. The final section, Divers, Divers May We Have Your Attention Please uses the swimming pool motif to disrupt the complacency of rational argument. Steve Hawley somehow manages to convey complex ideas in a concise and entertaining way, seducing our attention by visual and verbal paradoxes that can make us both laugh and think twice about our own complacency.

RAYMOND GHIRARDO and MEGAN ROBERTS : VIDEO Tuesday 25 January at 6.30 and 8.30



The video works of Wyoming-based Ghirardo and Roberts have been shown throughout the United States and have collected prizes at international video festivals in Tokyo, San Francisco and Minnesota. This will be the first screening in this country of a repertoire which ranges from the laid-back, anarchic narrative of Life With Ray, the first of a putative 13 part series which stars a remote-controlled battery-operated toy tank, to the hilariously simple melody of But It Was a Life Well Organised, a video song for television with the instantly recognisable listing of the mental notes we all make of Things To Do but somehow never manage to get done.
