The footage may be found but the wit is all his own. Though debased Hollywood footage forms the substantial core of George Barber's work, nevertheless he transforms it so greatly it becomes something quite unique. Initially, Barber carved out a niche for himself in 'Scratch Video', by making great use of colour and multilayering fast imagery. Then he moved on and incorporated into this mix the repetition of sounds and spoken phrases. ('The Greatest Hits of Scratch Video' Vol. 2) In this work, by extracting isolated moments from Hollywood and cleverly inserting them into specially made music tracks, he was able to short-circuit movie 'grammar', destroy the 'sense' and offer them up anew. Ultimately, they became films commandered into the service of a much more abstract and painterly aesthetic. Whoever can watch "THE DEEP" starring Brooke Shields after the Barber treatment it got in "YES FRANK NO SMOKE"? Again, "ABSENCE OF SATAN", if ever there were a quintessential video art moment, it would be the repetition of Paul Newman shutting a car door cut with a descending helicopter.

Current with Scratch, he unexpectedly has always had an interest in writing and this matured to good effect in 'TAXI DRIVER TWO', a short starring Johnny Morris featuring a memorable Robert De Niro evening class. In more recent times, he seems to have combined the two strands. In "PASSING SHIP" for example, he utilizes a 'Chelsea Girl' split-screen format, inserting one of his own personal monologues alongside a generic Hollywood disaster film - 'Airport 111'. As in the film, he hijack's the show.

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George Barber's work has an unusual breadth and is rarely less than alive, busy and entertaining in its aims and effect.

Furthermore, the tape has also been shown on French, German, Italian and Swedish television. Extracts have also been on BBC 1, BBC2 and BBC Bristol. Stephen Bode, writing in the Braknell Video magazine, dubbed me 'the Henry Ford of independent video!'
