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ACTION-RESEARCH SEMINAR WITH VIDEOTAPE PLAYBACK, 16th July, 1975

"Low Gauge Videotape as a Production and Distribution Medium" National Film Theatre 3, South Bank, 3pm - 5pm.

"A LOCAL HISTORY" (West Kentish Town 1900-1975) 20 minute black-and-white half-inch videotape, rough edited version.

This is a social documentary videotape describing the changes in the architecture and quality of life, as observed and remembered by Old Age Pensioners.

The production has been grant-aided by the British Film Institute, the hosts of this seminar, with technical assistance from the British Council donated on a goodwill basis.

Production Details:

Preresearch and gathering of raw materials: 1 person-week Shooting: 3 " "

Post-shooting production(viewing, logging, additional shooting, editing, audio mixing): 4 " " First wave distribution: 1 " "

This work was, however, spread out over several months.

Task Force, the commissioning agency, were responsible for setting up and arranging interviews.

ACTION-RESEARCH SEMINAR

The videotape production 'A Local History' is an experimental project, and some new information which applies cybernetic methods to video production and distribution (see <u>Production Algorithm</u> sheet) has been brought up in the course of the project.

This is the first time the British Film Institute has funded a video production. It is also experimental in that no-one in the U K has yet succeeded in producing a finely-edited product, using half-inch videotape, and suitable for general distribution.

However, we feel that the rough-edit of 'A Local History' is far enough advanced to demonstrate the potential of half-inch video as a general, low-cost production medium with wide applications in the public sector.

In Australia, U S A and Canada, where publicly funded video

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production facilities are available, such productions are now commonplace. This is not the case in the U K because, as yet, no such public facilities exist with the requisite technical sophis-tication. (This statement includes the Kendal, Bradford and Merseyside Arts Centres). But the use of <u>portable video</u> in many varied applications, is on the increase in the public sector in the U K.

Technical Constraints

State-of-the-art software limitations are caused by technical constraints in the editing and processing stages of production. These constraints could be removed with a small amount of public investment in the purchase and modification of existing video hardware. This would be carried out as a <u>Research and Development</u> <u>programme</u> aimed at producing models of working systems for use in the public sector (including public access).

Such an R & D programme would also include development of management and accountability models.

Briefing

Any organisation concerned with the use of portable video in any capacity will eventually face the problems of post-shooting production and editing, and also distribution of the finished product. We feel that a comparison of examples/models from different fields would be valuable right across the public sector.

We are therefore asking persons attending the seminar to bring with them, in convenient form, information on the ways in which your organisation/Department is using, or thinking of using video.

Everyone who contributes information will receive a summary of all the information produced. There may be cause for further inter-departmental cooperation and exchange of information should it prove possible to establish a Research and Development project as outlined in <u>Technical Constraints</u> above, and Technical Reports Nos. 1 and 2 which will be available for inspection at the seminar.
