SENDER

SENDER is a project which addresses the place of video art and its presentation with particular regard to the exhibition of works on television. The distance between the lounge with TV set and the gallery with monitor on plinth - the intimacy and free choice of the former and the alienating situation of the latter - becomes a key reference point for the installation. The material is presented so as to shift the viewer's perceptions between these modes of viewing, creating an environment at once homely and strange and where the familiarity of television programming is disrupted by the intervention of video art works specially commissioned by the projects' creators, Battersea Arts Centre.

KALEIDOSCOPE

Mineo Aayamaguchi

A bank of 25 television screens flicker with images of urban and rural environments: a neon light reflected in a puddle, a field of marigolds projected upside down. Multiplied and contrasted they form a collage of images which dance across the bank of screens and are in turn picked up and reflected in a disc of brass and by a triangle of polished brass fragments positioned on the opposite wall. The effect is a mesmerizing environment of colour, light and sound.

Born in Japan, Mineo Aayamaguchi studied at St. Martin's School of Art, and has lived and worked in London since 1974. Kaleidoscope was first shown at the Institute of Contemporary Arts and Aayamaguchi has also exhibited at the Tate Gallery and in Europe, America and Japan.
