Sunday 17 February at 8.00 in the Theatre VAMP: live video and improvisation

VAMP is a new performance group presenting a unique synthesis of improvised music and coloured video. The video performers are Peter Donebauer and Richard Monkhouse, who produce continuously changing coloured TV images, which are chiefly abstract; they influence and are influenced by the musicians, Simon Desorgher (flute and electronics), joined on this occasion by Barry Guy (bass and electronics) and Roger Heaton (clarinet).

Sunday 24 February at 8.00 in the Theatre Lontano with Beth Griffith (soprano/actress): works by Gerald Barry.



Gerald Barry was born in Eire in 1952 and at present lives in Cologne, where he's been a student of Stockhausen and Kagel. This programme is the first in England to be entirely devoted to his work. It includes the first performance of a new ensemble piece for eight players, commissioned by Friedrich Cerha, and the first UK performance of a new piece for two pianos. The American Beth Griffith, who took part in the first performance of Kagel's *Bestiarium*, features in two dramatic and amusing works: one uses a witty Japanese text by an Imperial lady-in-waiting of the tenth century, the other explores a personality by means of mime.
