Born Israel 1953. Studied at Bezalel Acadamy of Art & Design, Israel. Works shown in U.K., Israel,U.S.A. & Europe. Lives and works in London. Works with Question Mark Video.

Free Flow '82.

Two colour video monitors are placed on their sides. The same tape is shown simultaneously on both. The piece features seven continuous segments of image synthesis produced structurally as a horizontal roll. By placing the monitors on their sides I am producing vertical rolls converging in the centre of the installation.

Free Flow deals with process into feeling.

Ground Floor Gallery: Tamara Krikorian; 'Time Revealing Truta'

Tamara Krikorian

Born in 1944. Studied music, worked first in theatre, then in visual arts. Founder member of London Video Arts. Works shown internationally since 1975. Teaches at Maidstone College of Art. Writes for Art Monthly, Aspects and Studio International.

Time Revealing Truth

The title 'Time Revealing Truth' comes from an allegorical painting by Francois Lemagne in the Wallace Collection. While continuing to use allegory and metaphor in my work, I am attempting to move away from the didactic implications of the 'Vanitas' project and to work more directly and perhaps intuitively, leaving more to the viewer/audience for speculation and interpretation. There are in any case several: calings to any one statement, each of us having a point of view and a current obsession though sharing a common experience. The title 'Time Revealing Truth' seems to be approprite to my readings of politics and history where the truth will always come out even if it means waiting for it over decades, if not a generation. In the installation all this is presented as a series of fairly abstract concepts whose strands will remain deliberately fragmented.

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Upper Gallery: Tina Keane; 'Demolition/Escape'.

Demolition/Escape

Perform and film and juxtapose Illusion and reality Narrative and abstraction Folk Street Children to High Art to Neon against fine drawn line and find new question for Seeing and behaving Internal and external

A column of video monitors floor to ceiling every other one to be placed upside down, so that the recorded image, a performance of me climbing a rope ladder gives the impression of moving from level to level upwards and brings into play patterns, space and movements, light and shadow, and the sensation of escape. The souldtrack is of demolition sounds intercut with a childrens' street song.

The sound track was first made for Audio Arts Live to Air at the Tate Gallery, August 1982. It has also been played on the John Walters Show, Radio One.

I then decided to make a video/performance installation to indicate the shifting of levels visually.

'We Have Fun Drawing Conclusions'

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is an expanded installation version of a short tape I made in 1982, and uses two monitors and five slide projectors. The starting point was a number of tapes I had made which explored the process of logic (and its alternatives) and the installation looks at some of the premises from which the conclusions of our adult lives are drawn. I was struck when looking through an old pile of school reports, my own and my sister's, how the formalised language used in them presented a remarkably consistent view of human nature and aspirations, which was totally at odds with that unconciously (I think) put forward in the children's readers used in the schools. There seemed to me to be two languages in use, of work: and of play, both shot through with categorical assumptions about the Way Things Are..., and both equally narrow in their tunnel vision of the world. The installation sets these in opposition, and then in combination.
