About the Work

Although I have produced video installations for specific occasions, and continue to do so when it seems appropriate. employing a number of TV monitors and multiple tape sources, I prefer at present to make tapes for single-screen viewing by a relatively small audience. The viewers' awareness that they are watching events unfold in time is an important ingredient of the work. I like to utilise the suspension of disbelief which people normally adopt in front of a television set, whether for entertainment or 'factual' programming, and invite the viewer to join me in a series of complex games in which their trust in the veracity of what they are witnessing is continuously shattered and restored. For this reason, I try to employ techniques which are parallel to those found in conventional broadcasting, though with aims, and images, which are quite different. The tapes are 'about' the medium of video, but each tape also contains references to a social or political situation. My efforts to define my own position relative to the situation provides the 'plot' of each work.

Orange Free State, 1978, videotape, colour, twenty five minutes *State of Division*, 179, videotape or tape/performance, five minutes

Mixed Doubles, 1979, continuously evolving installation, twenty minute cycle

Dickler's Whammy, 1980, videotape, colour, fifteen minutes Wipe Retained, 1980, tape/performance, colour, ten minutes
